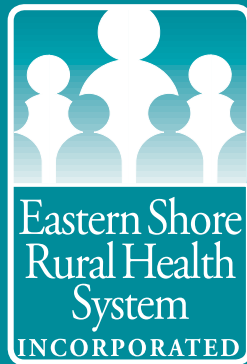

Board President's Letter

Eastern Shore Rural Health System, Inc. (ESRHS) became a reality in 1976 when a group of committed citizens joined forces to improve health care on Virginia's Eastern Shore. At the time, the Shore had one of the highest infant mortality rates in the state and an elderly population at 20% (twice the state average). There were only four physicians in Accomack County serving 30,000 people, and three of those physicians wanted to retire.

Accomack Rural Health System, Inc. received a \$100,000 Rural Health Initiative Grant. (The name was changed to Eastern Shore Rural Health System, Inc. in 1977.) A board of directors was selected and the organization was incorporated in 1976. The grant was used to open a rural medical center in Onley on July 19, 1976, with two physicians, two nurses, two business staff, and one director.

Since 1976, we've grown from one doctor's office to five medical centers, thanks to the tremendous support from our community. Two of these centers offer dental services and we also have dental sites at two elementary schools. We now have a total of 33 medical providers, 11 dental providers and more than 200 support staff. We are the primary medical provider of choice on Virginia's Eastern Shore. In the last fiscal year, ESRHS provided 112,815 office visits to 30,113 patients, including most of our pediatric population.

As ESRHS celebrates our 40th anniversary, that growth continues as we begin building a new facility in Eastville that will combine the aging Bayview and Franktown facilities.

We thank you for your continued support and hope we can count on you as we begin Eastern Shore Rural Health's next chapter.

CEO's Letter

PLANS FOR NEW EASTVILLE FACILITY TAKING SHAPE

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN BEGINS IN EARLY 2017

As we celebrate the 40th anniversary of Eastern Shore Rural Health System, Inc. (ESRHS) we are preparing for the next step in our growth.

We closed on property for our new Eastville Community Health Center on May 26. We've purchased 14 acres of property just south of the Eastville traffic light on the west side of Route 13 to build a new facility that will combine our aging Franktown and Bayview centers.

The new facility will have approximately 23,000 square feet compared to the 13,700 square feet that the current Bayview and Franktown have combined. By consolidating the two centers ESRHS will be able to offer a state-of-the-art facility that will provide potential expanded hours to include 10-hour days and Saturday hours, digital x-ray, expanded lab services and hours, potential telemedicine and additional providers and staff. Digital x-ray is currently not at either facility. Additionally, the current Franktown has dental services, but Bayview does not, so the new center will allow residents in the southern part of Northampton County increased access to dental care.

Finally, the new center will assist in recruitment of health care providers to the community, a plus given the Shore is recognized by the federal government as a region with a shortage of medical and dental providers.

A REQUEST FOR HELP

ESRHS is a 501(c)(3) non-profit Federally Qualified Health Center. As part of the nation's health care safety net, we serve both insured and uninsured patients. We work collaboratively with other area health care providers, community service organizations, and area schools. And, we have contracts with more than 100 corporations to provide pre-employment physicals, drug screens, and other services. We work with all of them to take care of all of you.

The total cost of the new center is an estimated \$9 million. We plan to finance the project through a combination of grants, foundations, and a capital campaign. We will exercise our borrowing power if need be. The annual federal program grant we receive can only be used to cover the medical and dental expenses of safety net patients who are underinsured or uninsured and meet federal poverty guidelines. The funds may not be used for construction. Therefore I am asking for your help.

It took a community to build ESRHS from one center in 1976 to what we are today. It will take the community to build the new Eastville facility. Please consider supporting us in this endeavor.

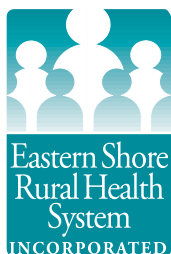

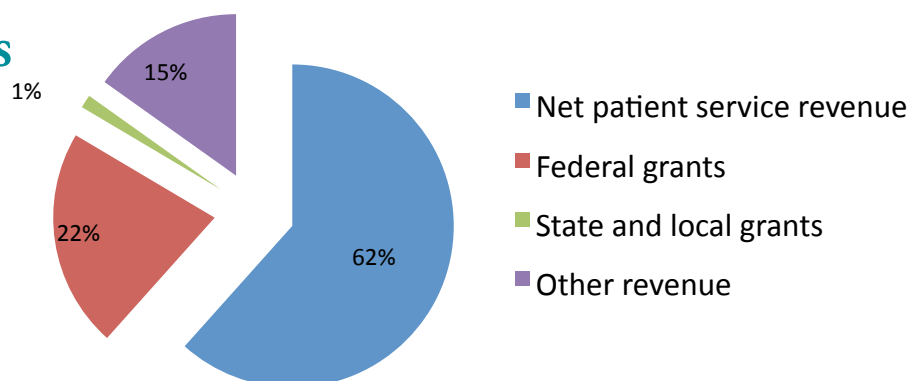

ESRHS Staff Receive Statewide Recognition



Ernest Augustin, a long-time outreach worker at Onley Community Health Center, was honored with The Tony Lawson Special Recognition Award by the Virginia Community Healthcare Association. ESRHS Meets 18 out of 19 Federal Requirements

Eastern Shore Rural Health System, Inc. aced 18 of 19 Health Center Program requirements in a Health Resources and Services Administration operational site visit that took place in August. HRSA, a U.S. Department of Health and Human Services agency, provides funding for ESRHS to care for the under and uninsured.

The 19 program requirements cover a range of criteria, including meeting the needs of the community, offering essential services, management soundness and financial compliance, and governance. Specially trained community health center professionals conduct the review, many of whom have extensive experience on the front lines of community health centers.

One of the “best practices” cited was the active collaboration between ESRHS and its community partners, specifically, Riverside Shore Memorial Hospital.

“Eastern Shore Rural Health was recognized as a center of excellence and a model for the country,” said CEO Nancy Stern. “From our employees, to our Board, to our facilities and leadership, we were described as ‘Cream of the Crop.’ Two of our reviewers would like to return with some of their leadership from their centers and show them how it can work!”

Health Care Plan Measures and Results

Eastern Shore Rural Health faces challenges with managing chronic diseases. This chart highlights key health measures tracked by ESRHS.

Each year, the federal Bureau of Primary Health Care assesses how community health centers have performed against these health measures. This past year, Eastern Shore Rural Health's results have exceeded both state and national results for clinical quality standards for 10 out of 14 measures!
